

COmmunicating Needs and Features of IBD Experiences (CONFIDE) Study: Key Results for US Patients with Crohn's Disease

The CONFIDE study aims to better understand the impact of Crohn's Disease (CD) symptoms on patients' lives and elucidate gaps in communication between HCPs and patients.¹

Key findings: In the US, bowel urgency is the second most commonly experienced symptom by patients with CD, irrespective of receiving advanced therapies. However, bowel urgency is not prioritized as an impactful symptom by HCPs.¹



Symptoms of CD negatively impact patients' quality of life



Conclusions: Bowel urgency is common and impacts patients with moderate-to-severe CD, despite receiving advanced therapies. The communication gap between patients and providers highlights the under-appreciation of the real-world impact of patient-reported outcomes on the quality of life.¹
